One or more prizes are offered for essays of up to 25,000 words on medico-legal subjects. A prize will be of at least £500 and may be of up to £4,000. Candidates must be graduates of the University of Cambridge or holders of postgraduate Diplomas or Certificates of the University and must have a professional qualification in medicine (including dentistry) or law. The subject of an essay (which may relate to either a medical aspect of law, or to a legal aspect of medicine) must have been approved by the Managers.
